Highlights from 2020 The new Connecting Champions ...

... the year when we became a national organization

Hi friends,

What a year it has been! Going into 2020, our team was so excited. "We're going to expand to a second city! Can you believe it?" Little did we know that it wouldn't be just a second city, or a third, or a fourth... We now have kids and young adults in our program from NINE different cities across the country. Our virtual mentorship program has been flying, and hospitals all over are asking us if we can bring it to their patients. Who knew it could be so exciting to pay taxes in other states?

We celebrated our 250th all-time friendship and opened our second physical location in partnership with WVU Medicine Children's Hospital. Our program coordinator has been designated "essential staff" by hospital leadership and is working side-by-side the rest of the care team during the pandemic. Our participation rate is 95% and our outcomes are getting some serious attention.

In March, everything may have stopped, but the kids and young adults needed us to keep going. The social isolation we all felt was only magnified for kids with cancer and their families. Each child could only have one parent with them in the hospital, and no siblings or friends.

The need for our program didn't just maintain — it grew.

We worked around the clock to develop a virtual mentorship program in a matter of weeks. We saw that kids and young adults with cancer across the country needed our help, so we decided to accelerate our strategy, dip into our reserve fund, and roll out our new program nationwide. Six hospital systems across the country have partnered with us, and more are putting together implementation teams.

Our virtual mentorship program is centered around helping the kids and young adults share passion projects with their mentors. Instead of simply talking over video each week, we send "passion project kits" so they can get a behind-thescenes look at a career / passion from the comfort of their hospital bed or home.

Connecting Champions is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.

One of our 21-year-old young women, Bree, wants to be a cosmetologist when she grows up. We sent Bree a mannequin so that each week she and her mentor, a local cosmetologist, can hop on video to perfect all kinds of beauty techniques.

One of our 10-year-old girls, Cecilia, loves dinosaurs so we paired her with a worldrenowned female paleontologist. Each time she's in the hospital, Cecilia and her mentor video to learn about a different dinosaur and the discovery process — and even dig up some fossils!

Last year I shared my belief that the best organizations have multiple founding moments. Well, this is the new Connecting Champions. We're no longer a local organization — we are a national organization. The future we always dreamed of is here.

Our Virtual Friendship Program is in 9 CITIES & COUNTING!



Within eight weeks of the pandemic, we designed a **brand new program** and partnered with hospital systems across the country. Kids and young adults from nine different cities have signed up for our program. Hello Chicago, Morgantown, Cleveland, Buffalo, Grand Rapids, Washington, D.C., Dover, Cincinnati, and Pittsburgh! Stay tuned as we add more cities in 2021!

We reached **250 ALL-TIME FRIENDSHIPS**

One of my favorites this year is with a young girl in rural West Virginia who wants to be an aquarist when she grows up. We paired her with a woman from the Pittsburgh Zoo & Aquarium; the two of them are reading a book together and videoing with the animals!

We now have a second physical location: WEST VIRGINIA



In October, **we launched a "hybrid model"** in partnership with WVU Medicine Children's Hospital. Our program coordinator Sloane visits the kids & young adults in the hospital each day with her tablet and connects them, from the comfort of their hospital beds, with their mentors in the community.

We hired a **DATA ANALYST**

One of the most groundbreaking layers of Connecting Champions is our evidence-based, data-driven approach. We built Outcomes Reporting software and collect data on a daily basis. Having a dedicated Data Analyst (thanks to a grant from the R.K. Mellon Foundation) now **positions us to present our outcomes on a national stage** in the coming years.



Baylee, age 11, Future Aquarist

Baylee is an 11-year-old who **wants** to save all of the ocean animals when she grows up. We paired her with Ariella, an aquarist at the Pittsburgh Zoo and Aquarium. Baylee and Ariella meet at least twice a month virtually to discuss not only ocean animals, but also other animals! They have discussed sharks, penguins, turtles, polar bears, and red pandas just to name a few! Baylee loves meeting with Ariella so much, she decided she wanted to do her **Make-A-Wish at the zoo**

with Ariella for a week!
