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Dear Friends of L'Arche Atlanta,

L'Arche Atlanta's mission is to transform lives by building community among people with and without disabilities, working towards our vision of a world where everyone belongs. Our Core Members and assistants share faith-based lives in our L'Arche home, supported by a dedicated staff, board, and our enthusiastic volunteers and donors.

Thank you for standing with our community in 2019. It was a transformative year for L'Arche Atlanta, one we look back on full of gratitude. In September we announced our capital campaign to raise funds for a second L'Arche home, and by December — with your generous support



Last year, more than 420 people attended our community events. Staff and Core Members spoke at civic and community groups, including Candler School of Theology, area churches, and the Atlanta Autism Consortium forum on housing and disability, reaching many people with compelling, inspirational stories of hope and transformation.

— we had raised \$1.4 million to purchase and renovate a second house, currently owned by Woodlands Garden, for four new Core Members. This will double our residential life capacity and effectively double our community reach by having another hub for fellowship and togetherness.

In 2019, we continued our partnership with the Georgia Council on Developmental Disabilities (GCDD) through the Storytelling Project. The Storytelling Project team completed 25 deep-dive stories that profiled 33 Georgians with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). We produced a podcast series, Hidden Voices. We are especially proud of our minidocumentary film 6,000 Waiting that follows three people with IDD in Georgia through their journey to obtain a Medicaid waiver.

We expect to build on this growth in 2020,

continuing to elevate awareness of the L'Arche mission and values, so that everyone will have a place to belong. Thank you for joining with us in this important work.

We are so grateful for generous donors like you who make our work possible. We invite you to share our mission with those around you as we do our part to spread the joy in our community far and wide.



What We Do

Home-Based Professional Services

Community life at L'Arche Atlanta is centered around our communal home in the Oakhurst neighborhood of Decatur, Georgia. Four residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), known as Core Members, share the home with seven full-time assistants who provide personalized care in a family-like home environment. Healthcare professionals, government agencies, and disability advocates herald L'Arche as one of the best providers of community-based care for people with intellectual disabilities. In 2019, L'Arche Atlanta received a hard-earned accreditation from the Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL).



Through our events, we bring the celebration, spirituality, and connection found in the L'Arche home into the broader community. We host social events throughout the year and bring people with disabilities and their families together with the wider community. L'Arche Atlanta residents, family members, and an ever-growing number of people with and without disabilities are drawn to our hospitality and come together to celebrate by sharing our gifts. In 2019, more than 420 people with and without disabilities attended our community events.

Advocacy

L'Arche Atlanta advocates for people with disabilities to have the right to decide where they live, the resources to do so, and the support they need to thrive in the community of their choice. We speak to congregations, community groups, and advocacy organizations to build awareness and advocate for inclusion.

To advocate at the state level, we partner with the Georgia Council on Developmental Disabilities through the Storytelling Project. The Storytelling Project is a state-wide initiative to educate and motivate state legislators to act on issues that affect Georgians with disabilities by giving them a voice to share their stories. In 2019, in addition to written stories that profiled 33 Georgians with IDD, we produced a podcast series, Hidden Voices, which explored many aspects of life with IDD through the voices of 29 people with and without IDD. We also created a documentary film, 6,000 Waiting, that follows three people with IDD in Georgia through their journey to obtain a Medicaid waiver, while examining how the state's waiting list for the waiver ballooned to more than 6,000 people.

We wake up and start our routines with foggy eyes and murmuring to ourselves. It is mostly silent except for doorknobs creaking and feet shuffling on the floor. John sits at the end of his bed and says to me through the stupor, "Good morning." He sits on his bed, savoring the slow drift from sleep. He pauses in this transition before entering the day, knowing it will clip steadily along until it's spent. John exhales and pulls himself up, purposefully heading into the common space.

Nearing the front room, he greets Terry, who sits straight-backed and cross-legged, meditating or possibly sleeping in the deep-cushioned chair. John hollers a greeting into the kitchen while Corbin makes a pot of coffee. John's words are missed or misheard, meshed behind the coffee grinder's mechanical whir. Patrick sets himself a place at the table and waits for four toaster oven beeps, signaling there's peanut butter to be spread. John takes his usual seat with a cup of coffee and a plate of eggs.

Today, every day, the table holds our first-glance experiences of ourselves and each other. It serves as a setting for talk and eating, for fuel and centering; a place where we process our lives together. We bring our unceremonious encounters of joy and gratitude along with our honest anxieties and small irritations to the table and to each other. All are welcome to this table where our individual and unique rhythms intersect, and our unity is born anew each day.

John is one of the longest-standing members of L'Arche Atlanta's daily life, and one of the

first to encourage these sorts of conversations, exemplifying what it means to reflect and invite reflection from others. He finds room for growth, actively reimagining what it looks like to live meaningfully with the people he's committed to. The day ahead will hold any number of phone calls with friends, brainstorming sessions over hot chocolate, and leading the community in evening songs of gratitude. In all of this, John fosters a place of belonging, intrinsically knowing that the beauty of community exists in the blend of our unique and shared rhythms.

When breakfast concludes, Patrick and Terry head out to either work or exercise. Corbin's routine includes anything from bagpipe practice to cooking with friends. A little later, John is on his way to make calls at the L'Arche office or to volunteer, spending his time sorting through thrift store donation troves. These individual and communal rhythms fill each of our days; we flow with them and come back together around the dinner table. We discuss what we've experienced, then head to our own spaces to rest, until we find ourselves in the next day again.

a place to belong



Perhaps the most exciting moment of 2019 came at the 7th Birthday Benefit & Auction, when Executive Director Tim Moore announced a capital campaign to purchase and renovate a 3,800 sq. ft. seven-bedroom house currently owned by Woodlands Garden in Decatur. These plans were developed in response to the urgent need across the state of Georgia to improve services and build community for people with disabilities in the Atlanta area; to meet this need,

the leadership of L'Arche Atlanta identified a new house

to complement our current home in Oakhurst.

The response to the campaign from the community was amazing! Over 380 households, churches, foundations, and businesses donated over \$1.4 million to purchase and renovate the home. For this, we are incredibly grateful!

Because of your generosity, the renovated home will transform the lives of individuals with disabilities by providing new community, long-term housing, transportation, daily life supports, and a place of belonging, with access to meaningful friendships and social activities for life. L'Arche serves our Core Members for life (or as long as they choose to live in our homes), allowing them to age in place and providing peace of mind for their family members. We will select four Core Members based on criteria that include family circumstances, current/anticipated need, financial need, and racial and ethnic diversity.

The new home will also serve as a hub for our extended community, which brings together people with and without disabilities to re-imagine what true inclusivity can be. L'Arche homes provide an environment that nurtures mutually-transforming relationships for Core Members, assistants, volunteers, and friends.



The second house will not only serve accessible, supportive residence for Core Members and assistants. It will also be a thriving focal point of community life that demonstrates inclusion and belonging, an example of what life is like when people with and without disabilities can live and flourish together.
